Objectives

- Establish a training programme to support individuals into work
- Co-design and co-develop training specific to the sector
- Support learners to improve their prospects of employment
- Engage with project partners, social enterprises and training organisations throughout
- Promotion and uptake of the training programme and resources
- > Delivery actors to maximise impact (make a difference)
- Feed in learning into the BLUEPRINT model



Outcomes (Work Package 2)

- ✓ Training modules co-developed with partner organisations
- ✓ In the UK led by Anglia Ruskin University (ARU)
- ✓ Modules deliver training to Social Enterprises and individuals
- ✓ Piloted ARU Modules
- Engagement with project partners and training organisations
- ✓ Promotional & pedagogical support for SE & training organisations
- ✓ Blueprint Training Website
- ✓ E-Learning Platform (Moodle)



Highlights so far

- ✓ Module Co-development / Co-design
- ✓ Multiple delivery modes to enhance reach (flexibility)
- ✓ Modules specific to sectors, independent value
- ✓ Different entry levels to build up skills
- ✓ SE are engaged and delivery has started
- SCESE (Sustainable Circular Economy Social Enterprise) Network landscape mapped in the UK project area



Eligibility Criteria

- Meet the definition of disadvantaged person/worker
- ✓ Staff and/or Volunteers in Social Enterprise, or Small and Medium Enterprises (SME)
- ✓ Reside/Work in the project geographical area
- ✓ Self-Declaration by learners





Co-Design

- Inclusion of feedback from key project partners during the design and development of the 4 modules created by ARU.
- Introductory module well suited to delivery by Adult Learning Centres

Piloting

- Introductory ARU Module piloted by 2 Adult Learning Centres and 1 Social Enterprise.
- Feedback collated from learners and tutors.
- Other 3 modules to be adapted by delivery partners to suit target audiences.



UK Social Enterprises

- 100+ Social Enterprises have been identified as suitable organisations for the SCESE Network (accelerator)
- Developing scalability through engagement
- Social Enterprises in UK are already developing modules
- ARU's supporting role in the UK



Lessons Learned

- Marketing is a key success factor to delivery
- Different modules have different learner profiles
- The introductory module is suitable for all learners
- Some modules require tutor-led format
- Delivery needs to be monitored and recorded





- Online scorecard updated by delivery organisations
- > Targets
- Certificates to enhance CVs
- Monitoring learners who enter the labour market

- Other ARU modules that require tutor-led format amended, as required, by delivery partners to fit the needs of learners

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REDRESS - WORKING TO DRIVE CHANGE IN EDUCATION





Designers are thought to influence up to 80% of the environmental impact of products

- Only 31% of designers we surveyed received circular or design training as part of their university training
- 80% said they had to do own research to build their knowledge






 Sustainability is still far from being the staple it should be



 Tomorrow's designers are so much more than creatives



 Sustainability concepts can be hard to grasp

WITH BYT

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- Fashion companies are increasingly embedding sustainability
- Consumers are more aware and engaged



A GLOBAL PLATFORM FOR CHANGE

Placing emerging sustainable fashion designers and brands in the spotlight and providing them with real-world retail opportunities

Providing critical educational resources to support immediate and future needs for industry change



Promoting circular design within the broader mainstream fashion industry

Capitalising on market opportunities by aligning with, and showcasing, top sustainable designers and brands



EDUCATOR WORKSHOP INITIAL FINDINGS

RESISTANCE TO CHANGE - Extensive evidence of academics and teams not engaging with sustainability in their teaching of fashion and textiles. Likely due to lack of understanding, time and resources.

PERSONAL MOTIVATION - An overall feeling that though there are a growing number of examples of good practice occurring, these are sporadic and often motivated by the individual.

LACK OF SUPPORT - Academics that are engaged in teaching sustainability within their discipline often feel unsupported by their wider team and become independent champions for their team/department.
